World Heritage Sites

The World Heritage List includes 962 properties in 157 State Parties forming part of the cultural and natural heritage which the UNESCO World Heritage Committee considers as having outstanding universal value.


Biosphere Reserves

The World Network of Biosphere Reserves includes 610 biosphere reserves in 117 countries designated under the UNESCO Man and the Biosphere (MAB) Programme.



Geoparks

90 Global Geoparks spread across 26 countries endorsed by the Bureau of the Global Network of National Geoparks with Secretariat at UNESCO.


