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
The national adaptation plan process...

...enables countries to assess their vulnerabilities, to mainstream climate change risks, and address adaptation.

Its objectives are:

- 1. To reduce vulnerability to the impacts of climate change, by building adaptive capacity and resilience;
- 2. To facilitate the integration of climate change adaptation, in a coherent manner, into relevant new and existing policies, programmes and activities, in particular development planning processes and strategies, within all relevant sectors and at different levels, as appropriate.

Overview of elements and potential outputs



Element 1: Overview and key questions

Element 1 initiates the NAP process at the political level, takes stock of ongoing activities and existing information and creates a strategy to drive the NAP process.

- What outputs are expected from the NAP process, and when?
- What is there that the process can build upon?
- What are the linkages between development and adaptation needs which need to be considered?

Element 2: Overview and key questions

Element 2 analyzes climate scenarios and vulnerabilities, assesses adaptation options and integrates them into development planning.

- What are appropriate indices of climate and socio-economic trends which could support planning and decision-making?
- What are economic, ecosystem and social costs and benefits as well as potential unintended impacts of identified adaptation options?
- Which adaptation options should be prioritized?

Element 3 develops a **long-term implementation strategy**, enhances
required **planning capacity** and promotes **synergy** and **coordination** at all levels.

- What is the most appropriate timing and sequencing of adaptation priorities?
- What can be learned from other international experience and cooperation on adaptation planning?
- How can cross-sectoral and regional coordination of adaptation planning be promoted and enhanced?

Element 4 monitors and reviews the NAP process, updates the NAP iteratively and manages outreach and reporting.

- Which areas of the NAP process are key for its effectiveness and hence need to be monitored?
- What are frequency and triggers for an update of the NAP?
- What kind of information needs to be included in the reporting?

The guidelines...

- ...offer indicative activities and selected examples instead of prescription
- ...provide multiple entry points instead of strict sequence
- ...focus on national instead of external priorities
- ...facilitate strategy instead of dispersed activities
- ...enhance consolidation instead of overlaps
- ...encourage a holistic instead of individual approaches to climate adaptation and development
- ...emphasize continuity instead of a fixed-term process
