What is the NAP process?

A strategic process that enables countries to **identify and address their medium- and long-term priorities** for adapting to climate change.

It puts in place the systems and capacities needed to make **adaptation an integral part** of a country's development planning, decision-making, and budgeting.



The NAP process?



- **Strategic**, articulate priorities, timelines, \$
- **Coordinated**, across sectors and scales
- **Continuous**, not a one-time, ad-hoc affair
- **Iterative**, learn, adjust, do better



How can the NAP process be used to implement the Paris Agreement?

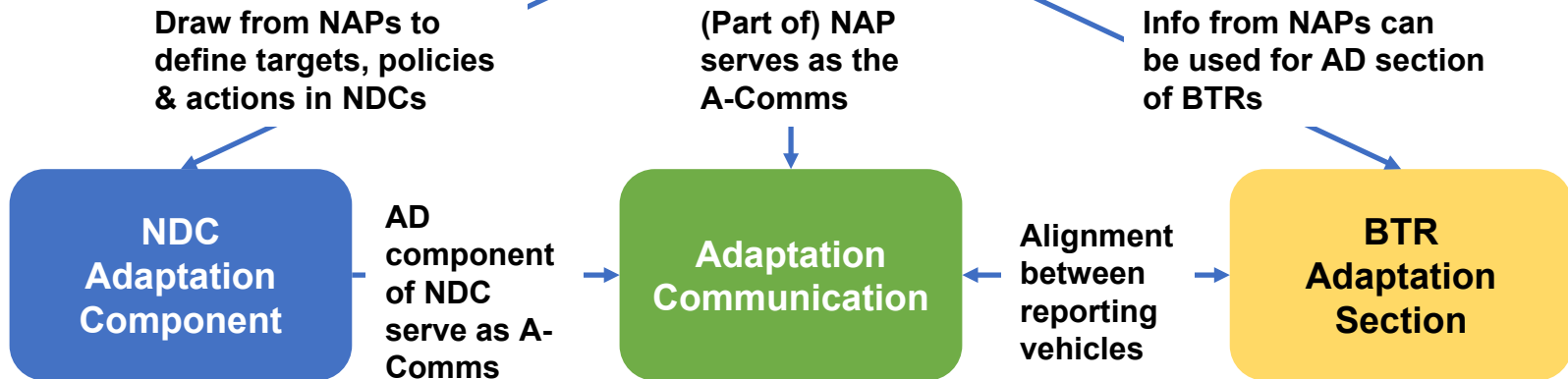
- NAPs are part of the Paris Agreement (Article 7.9):
Each party shall, as appropriate, engage in adaptation planning processes and the implementation of actions, including the development or enhancement of relevant plans, policies and/or contributions...
- NAPs / parts of NAPs can be submitted as an **Adaptation Communication**
- NAP processes can inform **NDC** updates, or vice versa
- Parts of NAPs can be used to prepare the adaptation section of **Biennial Transparency Reports**



- Development context & priorities
- Link to other international agendas
- Observed and anticipated impacts
Risks and vulnerabilities
- Institutional framework and arrangements – laws, policies, strategies, agencies, bodies
- Barriers to adaptation
- Experiences, good practice



- Vision, goals, principles of adaptation – gender, indigenous peoples and knowledge
- Adaptation priorities, strategies and actions
- Mitigation co-benefits
- Costs
- Partners and potential donors
- Capacity and technical needs
- Monitoring & evaluation

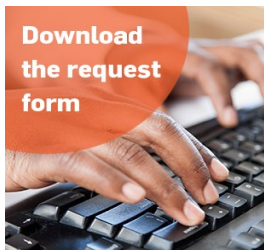

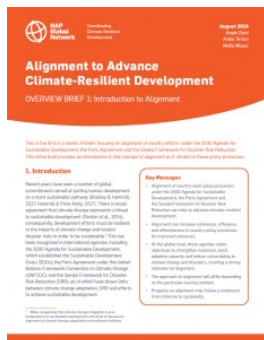
