Background and objectives

We urgently need climate action in priority areas revealed in the Global Peatland Hotspot Atlas launched at the-event. The Atlas bridges science and policy through thematic maps and visuals, uniting stakeholders to set ambitious targets and leverage funds for climate action on peatlands and wetlands.

The event is a call to action for scaling up efforts under the Global Peatlands Initiative, towards peatland conservation, restoration, and sustainable management. By presenting the latest knowledge in an engaging format, it aims to attract a broad audience and raise awareness of the vital role of peatlands found in nearly every country. It seeks to bridge discussions within the international frameworks of the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC), the Convention on Biological Diversity (CBD), and the Ramsar Convention on Wetlands, emphasizing that success in one convention is linked to the others.

The session will highlight the importance of integration, showcase available tools and data, and emphasize the urgent need for scalable financial solutions to support peatland actions that address climate change, enhance biodiversity, and ensure water security. Distinguished panelists with representatives from various countries will share their efforts in sustainable peatland management, highlighting successful initiatives and collaborative approaches that can inspire further global action.

Guiding questions:

- 1. How can countries better align peatland efforts across UNFCCC, CBD, and the Convention on Wetlands? Can you share examples of how your country is advancing **integrative goals**? How can global data such as the Global Peatland Hotspot Atlas be effectively leveraged to advance this?
- 2. Peatland conservation and restoration require substantial long-term funding and political commitment. What specific strategies or funding mechanisms (e.g. public funding allocations, subsidy reforms, blended finance) is your country exploring or implementing to ensure sustained financial support for peatland initiatives, and how can international cooperation strengthen these efforts?
- 3. How is your country ensuring the active participation and benefits for **Indigenous Peoples** and local communities in peatland management? What best practices can you share for balancing conservation with economic development?
