

The next 12 months are critical

We face a rapidly narrowing window to address climate change



Cities are key to delivering climate plans



- Growing population: By 2050, about 2.5 billion more people will live in cities, making up around 68% of the world's population.
- Growing emissions: However, as cities grow and economies develop, they're producing more emissions—without mitigation efforts, urban emissions could double by 2050

People are already experiencing the impacts

Climate change impacts in cities

of cities are already experiencing the impacts of climate change



The impacts of climate change include extreme weather events, rising sea levels, heat stress and landslides contributing to pushing

132 million into poverty in the next decade

- 70% of cities are already dealing with climate impacts such as droughts, floods, and the heat urban island effect.
- Immediate and long term effects:
 Beyond dealing with the immediate effects of climate impacts, long term changes include pushing people into poverty.

Commitment to tackling climate change's complexities within urban contexts



Ministerial Meeting on Urbanization and Climate Change

- Convened over 1,000 people including around 60 ministerial representatives
- Joint Outcomes Statement is a ten-point strategy for an efficient and effective response to the climate crisis

Paris Agreement Goal, 2030 To limit global warming to 1.5°C, GHG emissions must peak before 2025 at the latest and decline 43% by 2030.
