# Backward looking: Collective progress, gaps, challenges, and barriers

- Based on recent reports, states that we are not on track to meet the Paris Agreement goals , particularly from the technical assessments of the GST itself.
- The GST is significant in this critical decade to course - correct and get us back on track towards the Paris Agreement Goals.

Although great progress has been achieved, substantial work lies ahead.

More opportunities and solutions arise from challenges in the implementation of climate commitments. Countries in Southeast Asia can learn from each other's experiences and share best practices to accelerate climate action implementation and support in the region.

# Forward looking aspect: Opportunities and messages for further action

- Forward looking views provides a snapshot of what we can work on:
  - In-country technical policy development support
  - Encourage collaboration between Parties and NPS, and
  - Develop advocacy campaigns to communicate the outcomes of the GST1 to the region, national, and local levels.
- Strengthen international cooperation by leveraging a regional stocktaking
  - Bottom up approach: local and national level experiences as important building blocks
- Expectations for COP 28: look forward for a robust CMA decision encompassing collective progress and political messages on opportunities.
  - 2024 2025 will be a critical window to translate and tailor the outcomes of GST1 into concrete action plans conveyed in the next round of NDCs.

Policy Recommendation 1:

Integrate the role of NSAs into the national policy - making process in the follow - up period of GST1

- NSAs can contribute to the follow up of GST1 in multiple ways
- It's important to make the role and responsibilities of NSAs clear in the national policy - making process
- This includes ensuring the opportunities for NSAs to engage with Parties' updating NDCs as well as providing financial support for NSAs to implement their activities in support of the GST

#### Discussion at the APCW :

- NSAs include the private sector, financial institutions, cities and other subnational authorities, local communities and Indigenous
  - Peoples.
- We need more concrete stories from various actors and regions are needed.

Policy Recommendation 2:

Make use of regional collaboration platforms of NSAs that can facilitate a regional stocktake to translate the outcome of GST1 in updating and enhancing NDCs

- NSAs can share good practices and explore areas for cooperation specific to each region.
- Such regional stocktake can help Parties translate the outcomes of GST1 into their respective NDC.
- Existing regional high level policy forums, such as ASEAN and policy advocacy forums organized by NSAs, can be useful entry points.

#### Discussion at the APCW :

- If successful, GST can connect governments and NSAs ever more strongly.
- We need creative ideas to connect GST with regional, national, local actions.

Policy Recommendation 3:

Build in - country mechanisms for incorporating the outcome of GST1 in updating and enhancing NDCs, and for monitoring and reporting of the implementation of those NDCs .

- This ensures that Parties consider the outcome of GST1 with the participation of NSAs systematically as part of the NDC update and implementation process.
- Ex-post reporting of Parties' experiences and lessons as to how it incorporates the outcome of the GST1 can be extremely useful for designing the GST2 and beyond

Discussion at the APCW :

- The GST should not only assess collective progress, but also promote solutions to fill the gaps it identified.
- We need to understand common areas of collaboration between governments and NSAs.
