Carbon Capture and Storage (CCS): Making It Happen on Wednesday, Dec. 3, from 19:30 to 21:00 in the Fox Room is the one side event YOU MUST ATTEND!

The session builds on the world-wide reputation the University of Regina has developed over the past 20 years as a leader in CCS technology as well as organization with a track record of success in collaborating with researchers from the private and public sectors around the globe.

In one, 90-minute session you will hear from five speakers who will make compelling arguments about why we need to move forward – NOW – with the deployment of CCS. This session will provide a framework action.

Malcolm Wilson, Director of the Office of Energy and Environment at the University of Regina, will moderate discussion and outline the goals and objectives of the IPAC-CO2 that was created only a few weeks ago. Malcolm sits on the Executive Committee of the International Energy Agency Greenhouse Gas R&D Programme, the science advisory board for CO2GeoNet and CO2Sink and two European major science programs. Malcolm was a member of Working Group III of the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) team working on the Special Report on CO2 Capture and Storage. This team was part of the IPCC group of scientists that were awarded the **2007 Nobel Peace Prize** along with Al Gore.

The keynote speaker is **Jan Adams**, the Ambassador for the Environment with the Australian Department of Climate Change, who will discuss developed country views on CCS and the role of CCS in developing nations under CDM. Her talk is 25 minutes.

Succinct ten-minute presentations will be made by:

- **Dr. Shen Pingping** of China on the geological and safety aspect of CCS;
and
- **Antonio Pfluger** of the International Energy Agency (IEA)
on the economic impact of CCS;
and
- **Frederic Hauge**, Founder and President of the Bellona Foundation, who has been promoting CCS from the NGO perspective for more than a decade.

Delegates will be able to engage the speakers in a lively discussion following the presentations.
