NEW FEE STRUCTURE ENSURES CONTINUATION OF JI WORK

• 2010 – <u>Severe resource constraints</u>

Fee structure for Track 2 only

• Today – <u>Reaching sustainable levels</u>

Fees from Track 1 and Track 2 (from April 2011; CMP.6 decision)





CMP REQUESTS PARTIES IN CANCUN DECIDED TO:

- a) initiate first review of JI guidelines at CMP.7 in Durban
- b) ask JISC to make recommendations on options for building on JI approach
- c) request JISC to implement action areas from experience report
- d) establish provisions for charging fees on Track 1 projects



CMP REQUESTS (continued)
PARTIES IN CANCUN ENCOURAGED THE JISC TO:

- e) make further efforts to facilitate the process of accrediting IEs
- f) continue enhancing implementation of verification procedure
- g) promote transparency and enhance interaction between DFPs, AIEs, PPs
- h) strengthen outreach activities to improve overall JI understanding



"The overwhelming sense of the JISC is that significant changes in the setup of the mechanism will be needed if JI is to realize its potential and secure its relevance as a mitigation tool beyond 2012."

KEY RECOMMENDATIONS

IN THE CONTEXT OF THE FIRST REVIEW OF THE JI GUIDELINES

- <u>Single, unified</u> verification process (single Track)
- <u>New governing body</u> to oversee the single verification process
- <u>Harmonized national procedures</u> for approval of projects
- The new governing body should be responsible for issuance
- Unified accreditation process to accredit auditors, report to the CMP
- A mixture of fees on accreditation, registration and verification



KEY RECOMMENDATIONS

A. Allow issuance to existing and new projects <u>between 1 January 2013 and</u> <u>either the end of the "true-up" period or the establishment of assigned</u> <u>amount for a host Party for a second commitment period under the Kyoto</u> <u>Protocol</u>, whichever is sooner. Requires converting of AAUs or RMUs from the first commitment period;\

<u>OR</u>

B. Decide to adopt, at CMP8, modalities and procedures for issuance under Track 2 and the subsequent deduction of units from future emission reduction or limitation targets.



BUILDING ON JI's STRENGTHS

- Wide flexibility
- Assurance of real and additional emission reductions
- Incentivize private sector mitigation efforts
