The SB44-meeting in Bonn marks the beginning of the Paris Agreement's implementation and comes at a time that discussions on carbon markets are gaining renewed prominence:

- The **Paris Agreement** provides the framework for new mechanisms in its Article 6 and leaves room for interpretation in its implementation.
- While facing legal challenges, Obama's **Clean Power Plan** could enable US States to achieve GHG reduction targets with the support of carbon market mechanisms.
- In the **EU Emission Trading System**, a proposal for reform towards 2030 has been tabled, after adoption of the Market Stability Reserve to balance supply and demand.
- Additional states and regions (ex. China) have started carbon markets in recent years and could provide powerful partners for the **linking of Emission Trading Systems**.

In this context, our experts **Aki Kachi** and **Michael Mehling** will discuss existing options for the development of carbon markets post-Paris and provide a perspective on what they could mean for carbon markets in the US and the EU. Our experts' presentations will be followed by a discussion, moderated by **Matthias Duwe**.
