Speaking from the heart



The REC celebrated its 25th anniversary with the high-level event "Regions for a Sustainable Future: Results – Empowerment – Change: The REC towards the next 25 years", organised under the patronage of H. E. Janos Ader, President of the Republic of Hungary. The event took place on June 10–11, 2015, at the REC's head office in Szentendre, Hungary.

The discussions and contributions covered past results, present efforts and future directions, thus giving a strong input to the REC's new strategy for the years 2016 to 2020 and providing recommendations for the REC on how to facilitate progress in environmental governance, low-carbon development and the regional challenges of the UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

June 10

The event was opened by Andrzej Kassenberg, Chair of the REC's Board of Directors, who recalled the history of the establishment of the REC and its importance for democracy building in Central and Eastern Europe (CEE) as well as for environmental protection.

Executive Director of the REC, Marta Szigeti Bonifert, explained how, "as new challenges are emerging, the REC is changing from a transitional to a transformational tool."

RESULTS

The first part of the anniversary event, moderated by Anita Orban, Hungary's former Ambassador-at-Large for Energy Security, focused on the results achieved by the organisation.

William K. Reilly spoke about the REC's transformational impact: "The environment in the region is much greener and cleaner

than 25 years ago. The REC should continue playing its role in promoting cooperation that is still much needed."

Timo Makela praised the assistance provided to the countries of the region, while underscoring the rule of law, human rights, freedom, civil society and democracy as fundamental EU values that the REC shares and promotes.

June 11

H.E. Janos Ader, President of the Republic of Hungary, opened the second day by expressing appreciation for the REC's work over the past quarter of a century in turning environmental and security risks into environmental cooperation, while acknowledging that the organisation anticipated the importance of shifting towards sustainability. President Ader acknowledged the present-day realities of climate change and the urgent need to work together as a global community to protect and preserve the environment. The mission of the REC is to bring officials, businesspeople, citizens and advocates together to work effectively towards the common goal of protecting the environment and building a sustainable future. That goal is as important today as it was 25 years ago.

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Contributions were received from: Lek Kadeli, acting Assistant Administrator of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (U.S. EPA); Benedek Javor, Vice-Chair of the Committee on the Environment, Public Health and Food Safety of the European Parliament; Karmenu Vella, Commissioner for Environment, Maritime Affairs and Fisheries of the European Commission; and Zsolt V. Nemeth, Deputy State Secretary of the Hungarian Ministry of Rural Development.

Lek Kadeli spoke of how the U.S. is proud to be one of the founders of the REC. "The nature of the problems is changing. The future success of the REC depends on the ownership and support of its countries. We all share a sense of commitment and responsibility towards the generations to come."

William K. Reilly read a letter from former U.S. President George H.W. Bush, dated May 26, 2015: "The mission of the REC is to bring officials, businesspeople, citizens and advocates together to work effectively towards the common goal of protecting the environment and building a sustainable future. That goal is as important today as it was 25 years ago."

Karmenu Vella sent a video message: "In the framework of the Stability Pact for South Eastern Europe (SEE) you played a key role. You ensured that the Regional Environmental Reconstruction Programme for the SEE region was put into place. You also helped prepare the countries in CEE for EU accession. You provided valuable support in their efforts to transpose and implement EU environmental legislation. Your approach has been valuable because it was hands-on.



Your work on how to best implement the Aarhus Convention is a guide for governments and parliaments, and has helped involve citizens more effectively. There will be no progress toward sustainability unless we involve civil society actively and early on both in the formulation of our policies as well as in their implementation. So I thank the REC sincerely for the work of 25 years! You have reason to celebrate and to be proud. For the future I can only hope you keep up the good work. A major challenge awaiting us is the implementation of the Sustainable Development Goals. As in the past, the REC will have a major role to play in their successful regional implementation."

During this session, H.E. Antonios Theocharous, Ambassador of Cyprus to Hungary, signed the Charter of the REC. A memorandum of understanding between the Al-Saad Foundation for Knowledge and Scientific Research of Kuwait (Sheikha Fadyah S. Al Sabah) and the REC was also signed to support education for sustainable development in SEE, the Persian Gulf and the Middle East and North Africa.

EMPOWERMENT

Moderated by Professor Elaine Wright of the University of Pennsylvania, the discussion on empowerment explored how the REC can catalyse processes in the region and beyond.

Ferid Agani congratulated the REC for its excellent work: "The ministry has very good cooperation with the REC. There is a huge need for support and assistance."

Praising the REC's role in introducing sustainable development values, Krasimir Zhivkov commented: "The REC is uniquely positioned to help transfer best practices and promote regional cooperation and initiatives involving national stakeholders."

Lidija Stebernak highlighted the REC's role, based on its 25-year experience: "Achieving sustainable development in the region will need a common action, with all stakeholders involved, with the strong role of civil society as well."

CHANGE

In appreciation of the REC's activities, Vojtech Ferencz noted that "The first national sustainable development strategy of Slovakia was developed with the assistance of the REC."

Congratulating the REC for its impressive achievements, Sergii Kurykin stated: "In Ukraine we are seeking more active cooperation with the REC."

Declaration

DECLARATION by the signatories to the Charter of the Regional Environmental Center for Central and Eastern Europe on the occasion of the organisation's 25th anniversary (Extract)

(...) We, the ministers of environment and high-level representatives, in our capacities as signatories to the Charter of the Regional Environmental Center for Central and Eastern Europe (REC), having met in Hungary on June 11, 2015, adopt the following declaration.

We congratulate the REC on its 25 years of dedicated service to the environment in Central and Eastern Europe (CEE) and beyond, and on the competence and expertise accumulated. The partnership initiated in 1990 by the European Commission, Hungary and the United States of America, and later joined by 29 other governments as signatories to the Charter of the REC, has made a vital contribution to the development of democracy and civil society in CEE, to EU enlargement, and to the transition towards sustainable development in the region. We express our profound appreciation to all the REC's donors. We thank all who have served on the Board of Directors and the General Assembly (GA), as well as REC partners, management and staff.

We acknowledge in particular the patronage of H.E. Mr. Janos Ader, President of the Republic of Hungary, over the 25th anniversary of the REC. The continuous support of the Government of Hungary has been instrumental in enabling the REC's efficient operation in line with its mission. We support the REC to continue to be part of the signatories' international agenda in the future.

Mission

We reconfirm the relevance of the REC's mission to assist partner countries in addressing environmental issues through the involvement of stakeholders.

Vision

We support the REC's vision to strengthen, by 2020, its role as a leading regional environmental organisation known for its accountability, independence, innovation, efficiency and effectiveness in facilitating responses to environmental challenges in Europe and beyond.

Added value

We acknowledge the added value of the REC having, for example, reached over 5 million students in more than 20 countries with educational tools for sustainable development; implemented local environmental action plans reaching 4.8 million people in 90 municipalities; strengthened more than 1,000 civil society organisations through capacity building and some 5,800 grants.

We commend the implementation of ministerial mandates from relevant international and regional conferences — including the Environment for Europe process, the European Environment and Health process, the OECD Environmental Action Programme Task Force, the Regional Environmental Reconstruction Programme for South East Europe, and the Environmental Compliance and Enforcement Network for Accession. We also commend the REC for supporting partner countries in the implementation of multilateral environmental agreements, in particular the United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change.

We recognise that the regional presence of the REC is an asset for the successful implementation of its mission-driven work. We welcome the transfer of lessons learned to other regions, especially in the field of environmental governance and education for sustainable development.

We acknowledge the REC's expertise as a regional platform for promoting and facilitating the implementation of the Post-2015 Development Agenda

We appreciate the cooperative approach of the REC and its work in partnership with relevant international organisations and stakeholders.

Renewing the mandate

We recognise the expertise that the REC is able to deliver as a regional mechanism to promote the implementation of relevant EU policies in CEE and South Eastern Europe (SEE), for example via Europe's strategies towards 2020 and beyond in the fields of environment and climate change, energy and circular economy.

We support the mandate of the REC as coordinator of the Environment dimension under the SEE 2020 strategy, enabling future programme development and implementation. We encourage the continuous involvement of the REC in the Eastern Partnership countries, with the aim of supporting democratic, inclusive and sustainable societies and cross-border cooperation.

We acknowledge the REC's expertise as a regional platform for promoting and facilitating the implementation of the Post-2015 Development Agenda, once adopted by the United Nations General Assembly.

Ownership

We recognise that the future tasks of the REC in the continuously changing and challenging international context require the strengthening of our ownership towards the REC and a coordinated approach on the part of the donor community in its development policies through the REC.

(...) We endorse the REC Strategy for 2016– 2020 and its focus on strengthening environmental governance, combating climate change and improving natural resources management in partner countries, and we are committed to promoting the implementation of the strategy through specific contributions, projects and initiatives.

We are determined to assist the REC to mobilise the necessary resources with mechanisms such as innovative financing, bilateral grants, competitive calls and processes and voluntary contributions to implement assigned mandates and achieve envisaged results.

Concluding remarks

We express our strong wish for the successful completion of the REC's assigned mandates and the achievement of the envisaged results, and we look forward to reconvening in 2020.

Executive summary of the REC Strategy 2016–2020

The REC Strategy for 2016–2020 is the key document for the future development of the REC and defines the priority issues on which the organisation is to focus. It aims to consolidate and build upon achievements to date and, at the same time, opens new professional horizons for the organisation as it faces environmental challenges in Europe and beyond.

The strategy is in line with the organisation's mission to assist partner countries in addressing environmental issues by involving stakeholders, and its vision for 2020 as having a stronger role as a leading regional environmental organisation recognised for its independence, innovation, efficiency and effectiveness in facilitating responses to the gravest environmental challenges.

The strategy envisages the translation of political support into the following mandates: (1) Supporting the SEE 2020 Strategy as coordinator of the Environment dimension; (2) Supporting the transformation of Eastern Partnership countries; (3) Supporting the implementation of EU policies and accession to EU funding opportunities; and (4) Supporting the transition to a circular and low-carbon economy. In pursuing its mission-driven activities and granted mandates, the REC will move exclusively to a results-based management system. During the 2016-2020 period the REC will work to achieve three main results: (1) Strengthened environmental governance; (2) Strengthened low-emission development, enhanced resilience to the impacts of climate change, and fostered sustainable and healthy lifestyles; and (3) Improved natural resources management. The REC's areas of professional specialisation will be grouped according to results-based management.

According to the strategy, results-based activities will be implemented in countries that are grouped on the basis of their environmental problems, political status and funding opportunities: the EU28, focusing mainly on new EU member states; EU enlargement countries; EU Neighbourhood countries; and other regions/countries. The REC will continue to have its headquarters in Szentendre, Hungary, with a strong regional presence as one of its key comparative strengths. Its country office network will be recalibrated to allow the organisation to respond in a more flexible manner to changing regional and country-specific needs.

Financial sustainability will be maintained through diversified funding via multilateral and bilateral donor relationships and by strengthening partnerships, exploring the possibility of establishing a trust fund, as well as participating in competitive tendering. As a non-profit organisation the REC's main target will be to achieve a long-term zero balance in its operations. In order to optimise the use of available financial resources, the REC will undertake the necessary organisational changes, monitor all expenses, and, in particular, make every effort to reduce its overhead costs. The REC will also maintain the highest possible transparency in its financial management and in the use of obtained funds. The REC Strategy will be implemented through annual work plans approved by the Board of Directors. Progress will be measured using a set of key performance indicators, valid for the REC as a whole and based on expected project outputs. Performance will be monitored annually via the work plans and the REC's performance appraisal system.

The REC is a catalyst that accelerates sustainable solutions in partnership with governments and non-governmental stakeholders. Our focus is on helping communities to strengthen environmental governance, shift to a low-carbon economy, build resilience to climate change, manage natural resources, and develop capacities for future environmental stewardship. As illustrated in the matrix, our projects, programmes and products cover the full spectrum of the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), which form the backbone of the UN's 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development, and we have solid experience in 47 targets out of the 169.

On the 25th anniversary of the organisation, the signatories explicitly expressed their wish and support for the REC to devote its work and efforts to the implementation of the SDGs in the region and beyond.

The REC continues to be an active contributor to major environmental processes and initiatives at the EU, European and global levels.

The REC contributes to various international processes, including the implementation of:

- United Nations Sustainable Development Goals
- Environment and Security Initiative (ENVSEC)
- South East Europe 2020 Strategy
- United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC)
- Aarhus Convention
- International environmental processes such as Environment for Europe (EfE)

The REC pays continuous attention to the creation and evolution of its strategic partnerships with international organisations, institutions and bodies, in order to best match the available expertise to problems and needs in an internationally coordinated manner and to achieve the targeted main results set out in its strategy.
