

... The 'big bang' theory of climate change negotiations explodes at Copenhagen








### State of global climate change negotiations

 Science broadly settled, but political difficulties to achieve even the modest commitments made so far.

 The main disagreement - Why should WE pay to achieve uncertain, shared environmental benefits, decades down the line?

 Health has a role to play – but high barriers to getting messages across.

# Health as a central principle of the 1992 Rio conference and the UNFCCC:

**1992 RIO DECLARATION Article 1:** "Human beings are at the centre of concerns for sustainable development. They are entitled to a **healthy** and productive life in harmony with nature."



**UNFCCC Article 1**: "Adverse effects of climate change" : changes in the physical environment or biota resulting from climate change which have significant deleterious effects on the composition, resilience or productivity of natural and managed ecosystems or on the operation of socio-economic systems or on human health and welfare.



# UNFCCC commitment to consider health effects of mitigation and adaptation measures:

**UNFCCC Article 4.1 (f):** All Parties...shall: ...f. Take climate change considerations into account, to the extent feasible, in their relevant social, economic and environmental policies and actions, and employ appropriate methods, for example impact assessments, formulated and determined nationally, with a view to minimizing adverse effects on the economy, on **public health** and on the quality of the environment, of projects and measures undertaken by them to mitigate or adapt to climate change;



## **Entry points within the UNFCCC process**

#### **NAPAs and NAPs**

- NAPA process COP7 Marrakesh Accords
- UNFCCC Framework for the preparation of NAPAs includes health together with loss of life, livelihoods, water, food and cultural heritage
- 2010 WHO overview of health considerations within the NAPA process
  - Health included in 95% of NAPAs as a sector impacted by climate change
  - 23% of those, comprehensive in their health V&A assessments
  - 11% of selected priority projects focused on health
  - 3% of the estimated total cost of selected priority projects to health

## Entry points within the UNFCCC process

### National communications (NCs)

- All Parties to the UNFCCC are expected to report on their country's implementation of the UNFCC
- Parties are requested to provide information for each policy and measure reported on non-greenhouse gas mitigation benefits such as reduced emissions of other pollutants or health benefits.
- UNFCCC Secretariat does not include relevant advice for such reporting in their guidelines to Parties for drafting their NCs

## **Entry points within the UNFCCC process**

- Fifth EU NC health included as a vulnerable sector and highlights the need of developing a cost-benefit analysis of environmental health risks and indicators for prevention strategies
- User Manual for National Communications by non-Annex 1 countries
  - Within the area of "national circumstances" report on health sector
  - Section on adequate adaptation information on health baseline conditions and their linkages
  - No concrete guidance on how to report on this


