

# ICAT Side event at SB62, Bonn Strengthening sectoral climate action through transparency Co-hosted by: Uganda & St Kitts and Nevis

#### Description

With case studies from Uganda and St Kitts & Nevis and the experience of Malawi, this event will feature examples and best practices on the challenges and opportunities of establishing sectoral mitigation action through integrated transparency approaches to inform NDC planning, design and implementation.

### **Background**

Transparency is central to making climate change action both effective and beneficial to national climate action and sustainable development policies. The foundation of transparency is good data: numbers that are vital for planning, managing and monitoring the implementation of policies and measures - and if they have met their targets. Often, data and processes are not aligned across different ministries and sectors preventing policy-makers from having a comprehensive picture and sectors acting in silos rather than working together.

It is important for countries to create integrated MRV systems spanning over multiple sectors to break down silos and create an enabling environment for countries to implement their NDCs and climate action targets. This will allow countries to effectively track progress on their NDCs and to meet the commitments under the Paris Agreement.

This engaging session will focus on the country examples of Uganda, St Kitts & Nevis and Malawi. Uganda has made great strides to evaluate its progress in tracking policy impact in the waste and transport sector by using climate action transparency tools. St Kitts & Nevis is on its path to develop an NDC tracking framework and use projections of GHG emissions in the energy and transport sector to inform their NDC planning and tracking. Both countries are at different stages in their journey and are well-positioned to share valuable insights for other countries.

#### **Objectives**

The event will contribute to the UNFCCC SB62 sessions by showcasing, inspiring and empowering policy-makers and practitioners to use integrated MRV frameworks to enhance climate action, increase coordination and allow for improved policy-making. We will offer a space to share knowledge and experiences on barriers and challenges and how to overcome them in the effort to improve the use and analysis of data and transparency. Through the event, we will be able to showcase and promote the use of tools and methodologies to support countries in establishing integrated MRV frameworks and strengthening their climate policies in light of the upcoming NDC 3.0 update.
